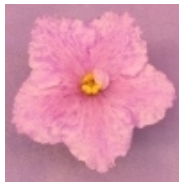

Attached is a photo of a Primulina 'Maxtimer' (not shown here) that I received about 18 months ago as a gift. I love the plant, but don't know much about the care. I am hoping for some advice. Here's some background. This plant has been in the same 2.5" pot since I received it. The person I received it from inserted a wick for watering but I have been watering from the top. I know it needs repotting, as the plant is about 9" tall and is

top heavy, and the soil is very old. It receives natural light, and I have attempted unsuccessfully to keep the growth balanced.

You can repot into a larger container, since it must be root-bound by now. Primulinas don't like to be overpotted, and tend to bloom when the root system fills the pot, so pot up gradually, one size at a time as the size of root system dictates.

To shorten its height, you can prune the tip, or not, it's up to you. Depends upon the appearance you want. Some will grow more bushy, others will grow more like a bonsai-type tree. You may have noticed a woody appearance to the stem/trunk of the plant as it ages. We can also see the beginning of a second shoot forming at the base of the plant. If you do remove the tip, it can be rooted.

How you water is up to you. So long as the plant gets the proper amount of water, when it needs it. Primulinas tolerate some dryness, and would rather not be constantly soggy, so if you do wick, be sure to use at least 50% perlite in the soil mix.

We grow most of our primulina under artificial light, so this will be fine. "Light is light" as far as most plants are concerned, so as long as the intensity is not dramatically different, the source won't matter. Your plant looks healthy, so you have a great start.

I have a primulina 'Rachel' and the leaves seem to be losing their variegation/white center stripe. Does this mean I need to provide more or less light? Would this recommendation also apply to sinensis 'dwarf'?

Not sure about light. Ours receive the same light as our African violets and other plants, but they'll tolerate both a little more or less. It's been our observation that this might be related to the pH of water. It seems that coloring of leaves might be better when water is slightly alkaline.

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
